Food Tasting – Thursday 18th May 2023



Our school dinners are very popular and provide the children with a healthy and nutritional meal. A school meal is provided **free** of charge to all our FS2, YR1 and YR2 children. Parents only need to pay for school meals once the children start the Junior school.

On Thursday 18th May, children who normally bring a packed lunch will also have the opportunity to try a school dinner. You can still provide a packed lunch from home as well as you so wish. The dinner choice on this day will be:

Red choice – Our very popular Roast Chicken with Yorkshire Pudding with potatoes and vegetables.

Yellow choice – Jacket Potato with cheese or beans

Both above options are followed by a Cup cake or Cheese & biscuits

Green choice – a freshly prepared sandwich with Cheese or Tuna filling and fresh fruit or vegetable sticks

There is a varied menu operating on a 3 weekly cycle and are cooked freshly on the premises. All meals conform to strict food standards which ensure they are healthy and nutritious. Our past experience of these 'taster days' have shown that the children really do enjoy their school meal. In addition, many children went on to choose a school meal option every day, and parents were thrilled with the savings they made in terms of the time and money it took to provide a daily packed lunch.

Benefit Related Free School Meals (Pupil Premium Grant)

As you may be aware, all children in FS2, Year 1 & 2 are entitled to receive Universal Free School Meals which is funded by central government.

However, many families do not realise that they may still qualify for benefit related free meals (pupil premium).

If awarded, your child will have the opportunity to enjoy a **free school meal, free educational visits, free Live & Learn after/before school sports clubs, Supermarket vouchers during school holidays and also to access Rotherham Healthy Holidays Clubs**

FS1 Happy Home Learning

In our phonics learning we have learned these sounds so far – **m, a, s, d, t**. Can you find these sounds in your home/school diary? (pages 24, 25 and 26).

Spellings

We have introduced the new Tricky Word/Red Word 'are' this week. Please encourage your child to practice this in their spelling books. If your child is not confident with the previous red words, please practice those first.

Literacy

This week we have been writing a script for a blog we will be filming next week about the life cycle of a chicken. Please encourage your child to tell you the stages of the life cycle and write these in their home learning books

Egg, chick, hen

Maths

Can you work on your Mega Maths mix up challenges in preparation for National Numeracy day which we will be celebrating next Wednesday 17th May. Your challenges are outlined on one side of the sponsor sheet and are as follows...

Count forwards and backwards in tens from 0 to 100.
Turn-taking and good sportsmanship! E.g. Snakes and Ladders/Frustration
Recall all the pairs of numbers that make 5, 6, 7, 8, 9 and 10
Tell the time at 30-minute intervals on an analogue clock. E.g. o'clock and half past
Make a repeated pattern with objects at home, for example with toys, buttons, pasta shapes etc

Order numbers to 20 from highest to lowest and from lowest to highest. Can you order multiples of ten from 10 to 100 and back again?

Make a picture using 2D shapes and label the shapes you have used.

Go on to the White Rose One Minute Maths App/Addition Challenge 8: Add 2 tens within 100

Choose two items and compare them in terms of their length and weight.

Learn a number rhyme or poem such as 10 Green Bottles/5 Little men in a flying saucer or any of your choice.

GP practices NO LONGER provide prescriptions for medicines that you can buy at the pharmacy, supermarket or elsewhere.

569 MILLION REASONS

+ PHARMACY



In 2017 the NHS spent approximately £569million on Over the Counter (OTC) medicines in England. This is money that could be used to support more serious and/or long-term health conditions.

What has changed?

Some medicines, that are available to buy OTC from pharmacies and supermarkets, are no longer prescribed by GP practices. GP practices will advise patients to buy these medicines OTC.

The medicines affected are those used to treat minor, short-term health conditions, which:

- you can easily treat yourself (self-care) or
- should get better on their own (self-limiting)

This change applies to OTC medicines for the conditions listed in this leaflet.

Why did we make these changes?

In March 2018, following national public consultation, NHS England published national guidance on reducing the prescribing of OTC medicines for minor, short-term health conditions.

It costs the NHS much more to prescribe these medicines on a prescription than if they are bought OTC. This is because the NHS has to pay extra fees for the medical consultation(s) and for the pharmacy to supply them.



What if I am exempt from paying prescription charges?

This guidance applies to ALL patients, including those who are exempt from paying prescription charges.

Where can I buy these OTC medicines?

These can be purchased without the need for a prescription from pharmacies, supermarkets and other retail outlets.

How much do OTC medicines cost?

Just like with other goods, the price of medicines may vary between retailers so it is a good idea to shop around to get the best value.

The average cost of most of these medicines will be around £2 to £3 and some will be even cheaper.

What if I need my medication labelled?

Schools, holiday clubs, carers, etc. may require medicines to be supplied with labels on them. Some pharmacies will label medicines purchased OTC for you. Ask at your pharmacy or speak to your GP practice to find a participating pharmacy.

Care navigation – right care, first time

Your GP practice receptionist may advise you to visit the pharmacy first. If you have already spoken to a pharmacist and tried OTC medicines, please bring these with you to your appointment.

Where can I get further advice?

Community pharmacies play a key role in advising patients on minor conditions that you can treat yourself. They are experts on medicines and can signpost to other services if needed.

Most pharmacies have a quiet area, away from other customers, where you can speak to a pharmacist in private. **You don't need an appointment, you can just walk in.** Many pharmacies also have extended opening hours, including evenings and weekends.
