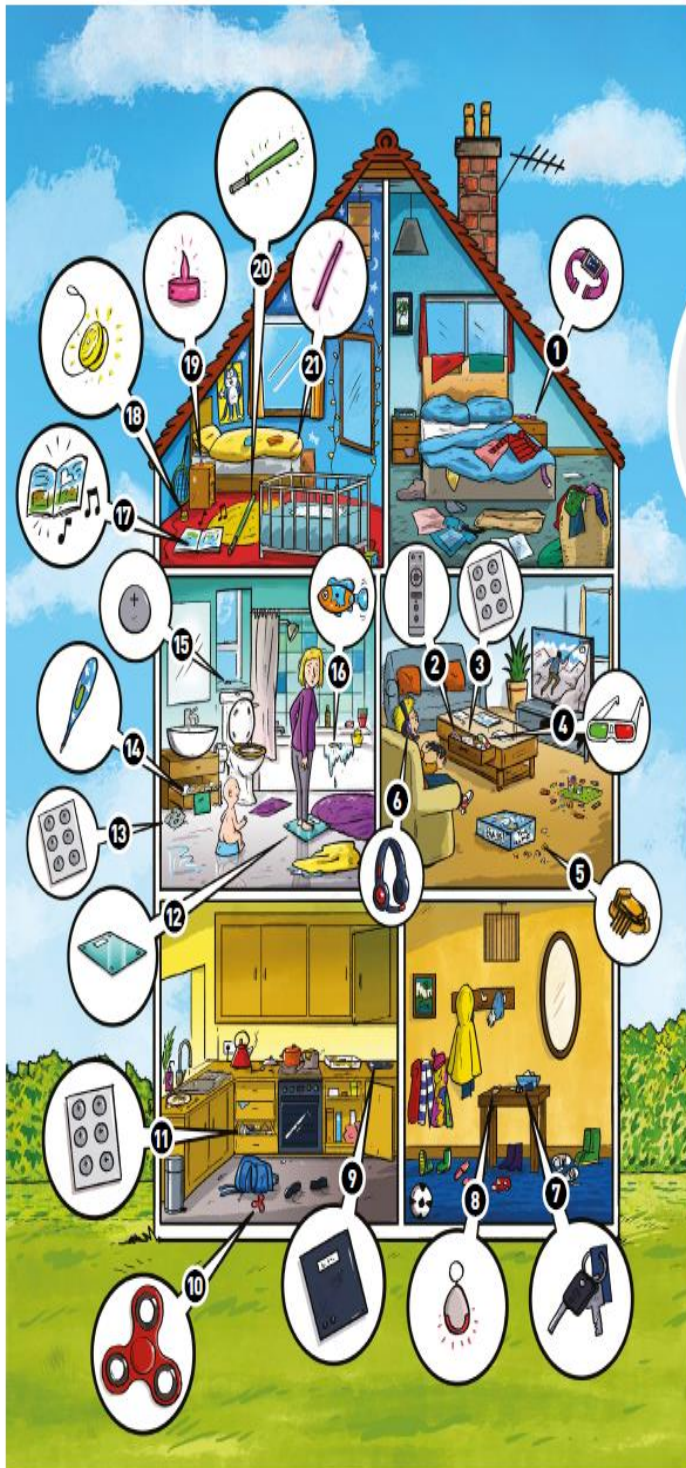


If you are unable to come in to school to sign up, please contact the school office who will reserve an appointment time for you.

# Button batteries - where are yours?



Button batteries, particularly big, powerful lithium coin cell batteries, can badly hurt or kill a small child within two hours, if they get stuck in the food pipe. Know where yours are, so you can keep your children safe.

**Five top tips**

- Hunt around your home for button batteries – in products as well as spare and ‘flat’ batteries.
- Keep products well out of children’s reach if the battery compartment isn’t secured.
- Store spare button batteries in sealed containers in a high cupboard.
- Remember that ‘flat’ or ‘dead’ batteries still hold enough power to badly hurt a child. So put them out of children’s reach straight away and recycle them safely and as quickly as possible.
- If you think your child has swallowed one, don’t delay. Trust your instincts and take them to A&E straight away or call 999 for an ambulance. Don’t let them eat or drink and don’t make them sick.

## E Safety Information for Parent(s)/Carer



**Monkey App**

**What is Monkey?**

- Monkey is a live video chat platform
- It is only available on Google Play store or via a web browser. It has been removed from the Apple app store.
- Launched in 2016 and has 30 million users worldwide

**How does it work?**

There are 4 key features on Monkey:

- Moments – short videos like Instagram Stories
- Videochat – one to one conversations, you can select friends or random strangers
- Texting – like direct messaging
- Swipe to Match – similar to online dating apps where you 'swipe right' for people you like the look of

**What are the risks?**

- Users should be 18 or older to join however there is no age verification process and it is marketed at teens. There are also no measures to block underage users.
- They state that they are an alternative to Omegle and Ome TV and have addressed concerns about privacy and content moderation however many users have reported seeing inappropriate and explicit content on the app.
- In terms of privacy, Monkey collects personal information from linked accounts, records IP addresses and usage statistics. They do not use end to end encryption on messages like more secure messaging apps such as Whatsapp and there are concerns about how protected uploaded photos and videos are.
- Users are encouraged to make in-app subscription purchases and these are promoted as a way to make more friends.

**Have open conversations about seeing or showing body parts online in photos or videos**

**Reinforce rules about talking to or meeting strangers**

## Information from Pharmacy First Scheme



The Pharmacy First scheme was launched by the government and NHS England on 31 January 2024 to give patients quick and accessible care and ease pressure on GP services

Pharmacy First will enable community pharmacists to supply prescription-only medicines, including antibiotics and antivirals where clinically appropriate, to treat seven common health conditions without the need to visit a GP.

# No doctor's appointment? No problem!

You can now access treatment for the below common conditions without the need to see your GP.

Earache      Impetigo      Shingles      Insect Bites

Sore Throat      Urinary Tract Infections in Women      Sinusitis

Speak to our pharmacy team for more information.

You can get treatment for these conditions by walking into the pharmacy or contacting them virtually. GP receptionists, NHS 111 and providers of emergency care will also be able to direct patients to pharmacies, that offer the service, if contacted.

The pharmacist will be able to speak to you privately in a separate consultation room. They may perform an examination or ask to access your medical records. The pharmacist will be able to recommend the best course of action on an individual patient basis, including by issuing prescriptions for antibiotics or antivirals where necessary.

Usual prescription charges will apply for the seven common conditions. Patients that were already exempt from prescription charges will still be exempt.

Patients can still choose to visit a GP if they wish to. Pharmacy First offers alternative access for these seven conditions and they encourage people to make the most of this service and to consult the highly trained professions in their local pharmacy.

This week we have started learning about London, we have read a story that has introduced the famous Landmarks. ## Class 5, Class 6 and Class 10 Homework

You can check that your child can speedily read the words individually out of order on the green word and red word pages to ensure they are not just memorising the story.

### Spellings

**Y2 Class 6 –some come your poor floor door**

### Maths

**Y1-** This week we have been making practical and pictorial addition stories and writing the matching equation. Use something practical to make two parts e.g two cars and 3 cars. Get your child to identify the parts....two is a part.... 3 is a part what is the whole? The whole is 5. Now can you write this story in 2 different ways.  
Start with the parts  $2 + 3 = 5$  Children need to say '2 plus/and 3 is the same as 5'

Start with the whole  $5 = 2 + 3$  Children need to say 5 (the whole) is the same as having 2 and 3'

## Y2 Class 6

This week we have also been exploring addition of a two digit numbers to a multiple of ten. We have used practical equipment to show what the numbers look like and to be able to count the total. (Use something like straws to represent tens and raisins to represent ones)

When you have counted altogether, look at the total. What has changed? Have the tens changed? Why? Have the ones changed? Why not?

$$12 + 10 = \quad 15 + 10 = \quad 23 + 10 = \quad 11 + 10 = \quad 25 + 10 = \quad 13 + 10 = \quad 17 + 10 = \quad 22 + 10 = \quad 14 + 10 =$$

You could now make some number sentences of your own.
